Last month, we talked about how prayer is merely "an intimate conversation with God" and I challenged you to deepen your prayer through quiet, consistency and simplicity (find that edition <u>here</u>). What has prayer looked like for you this Advent?

This month, we get to jump into Fellowship: Virtuous Friendships.

A routine Friday evening in the Eby household brings Cody home to immediately make a protein shake. He started working out with his friend Anthony, who owns a local gym. Sometimes I'm a compassionate wife who gives him a massage as he complains about his sore muscles, and other times I lovingly chuckle at him.

But despite the copious amount of bananas I now buy, I wouldn't have him trade this Friday ritual for anything. Because Anthony isn't just a workout buddy; he's become a brother in Christ who can challenge Cody to use his strength for the good of the Kingdom. Cody comes home from time with him reinvigorated in his love of God and desire to be a better husband.

We use the image of "hot coals" to best explain our need for Christian companions on this walk of discipleship. If you took a coal out of a fire, it would quickly cool off. But stick it back in the fire, and it takes on the warmth of the surrounding coals. That's exactly what Anthony and Cody do for each other.

How much easier is it to live the Christian life when you're surrounded and encouraged by people trying to do the same?

It isn't always easy to build this community. People's availability, shallowness of faith or natural introversion can all be barriers to finding not just friends of utility (people who are useful to us) or friends of pleasure (people we enjoy doing things with) but true friendships of virtue. While all these types of friendship are necessary and beneficial, it is in hanging out with our fellow "hot coals" that we are encouraged to be better disciples of Jesus.

## Do you have "hot coals" in your life? If you do, how could you take two seconds today and thank them for being steadfast friends? If you don't, what obstacles do you face in building the community you're looking for?
