

A CONTINUED WALKTHROUGH OF WHAT WE TEACH STUDENTS, ALUMNI AND PARISHIONERS ABOUT DISCIPLESHIP.

Dear partners in this wonderful mission,

Last month, we talked about how disciples walked so close to their rabbi they would get covered in his dust as a symbol of his immense impact of every aspect of their lives (find that edition here). October's topic is "Prayer—Spiritual Breathing."

I'm unintentionally going to start a *Chosen* kick here with another reference to the series, but I think this scene illustrates how one can be covered in the dust of a rabbi's prayer life. Jesus, after a day spent healing, tells his apostles he is going off to pray. One of the them quickly asks Jesus to teach them to pray like he does, just as John the Baptizer taught his disciples (Luke 11:1-4).

Jesus teaches them the Our Father. This simple prayer showcases the depth of friendship that Jesus has with God, trusting in him for provision and forgiveness. And friendship—intimate conversations with our Father—is what prayer is.

What it takes for us to grow in this friendship with God is consistency, quiet and simplicity.

Consistency is about praying daily for similar periods of time. Paul tells us to train like athletes (1 Cor 9:25). You wouldn't call someone an Olympian if all they did was a one-hour workout once a week! It's better to start small (try 5-10 minutes) each day at the same time.

Quiet is about settling your heart and mind so that you can pay attention to God. I have a good friend who call her prayer "quiet time with Jesus" and I think that's exactly what we're talking about. Look for a certain space—a favorite chair, a church, outdoors—that will help with any restlessness you feel in prayer.

Simplicity is about figuring out what you do in prayer. Don't overwhelm yourself by bringing the biggest books or most complicated prayers. Start with just a few lines of Scripture and have a conversation with God about how they apply to your life. You can also talk to God about any trials or triumphs in your life, and listen for his reassurance.

Do you yearn for greater intimacy with your Father? Where could you grow in consistency, quiet or simplicity in order to deepen your friendship with God?
