



For the Salvation of Souls

Brooke Dennison, Team Director at Tulane University

I became a FOCUS missionary because I believe God saved and changed my life in college, and I believe in the salvation of souls — and that's pretty much worth any career choice.

I think most people say yes to becoming a missionary for the sake of others, but I've learned that it changes you so profoundly. I have realized that I've been invited into Christ's own life by living mission — and that comes with great joys, but also an invitation into the sufferings of

When I got to Tulane, there were three women in discipleship. My first year was a lot of building — starting friendships from scratch, trying to create trust where there was none. That year, I was told, "You're here to start sorority outreach," and there was essentially nothing to start with. But the next year, I got to witness something amazing: All three of those original girls said yes to becoming missionaries. And one student I met that fall — who wasn't even Catholic at the time — entered the Church and joined staff as a missionary, too.

The girl I think about most is Bella. I met her in my first year. She wasn't baptized and only came to Mass occasionally. She came to SEEK through a sorority Bible study and had a beautiful encounter with the Church and adoration. When we got back to campus, I followed up, and she told me, "I just don't think I could ever become Catholic. I appreciate that this is for you, but it's not for me." So in freedom, I let go.

She went abroad, and I didn't hear from her. Then the first week she was back, she texted me: "Can we get a meal?" Over lunch, she said, "My life started falling apart. The only thing I could think to do was sit in Catholic churches. I was under this huge altar with Jesus and Mary and thought, 'What am I doing? I have to be Catholic.'"

Four months later, she was baptized, confirmed and received her first Eucharist. It's the best fruit I've ever experienced. When we present the Gospel, we're not taking someone's life from good to better — we're offering the chance to go from death to life.

When Words Fall Short

Ian Rush, fifth-year missionary at Harvard University

My wife, Grace, and I have been missionaries at Harvard for the past two years, after two years at UVA. Now we're preparing to welcome our first child. Living mission together — especially in a place that rarely sees family life — has deepened our trust in God and transformed not only our marriage, but also my extended family. My parents are returning to church, my brothers went through OCIA, and my younger siblings are starting to ask questions about the faith.

At Harvard, I work mostly with student-athletes, and we're seeing something like a revival. Most of them aren't Catholic, but they're searching for something real — and, tired of the shallow relationships and club culture, they just keep bringing their teammates.

One student, Stephen, was a disciple in our Bible study who entered the Church two Easters ago, but last fall he disappeared. When we reconnected, he shared that he'd lost several family members and was questioning everything — including God's goodness, even His existence. I asked if he wanted to talk, and he said yes. I thought, Alright, buckle in — Harvard-level philosophy debate inbound.

I did my best to respond and offer answers, and I think I did okay. But nothing seemed to move him. I thought, God, I've tried everything. He's still stuck. He's not going to Mass. He doesn't want to live the faith. Then something came to mind — something I'd heard a hundred times from FOCUS: Just tell him that God loves him.

I hesitated. Really, God? That's it? But I'd said everything else. So I looked at him and said, "Stephen, God loves you." He teared up and said, "I hope so." I said, "He does. He loves you."

That moment stuck with me. At Harvard, students who live their Catholic faith openly have to be sharp. They face opposition and persecution daily. But sometimes, what they need most is a reminder that they are loved by God.

That's what makes FOCUS different. It's not just catechesis — it's fellowship. You can learn a lot from podcasts and videos, but my life didn't really change until someone walked with me in person, asking, "Are you praying? Are you going to Mass?" That kind of presence is irreplaceable.



Working alongside campus chaplains and ministries, FOCUS helps cultivate vibrant Catholic communities that speak to the needs of every student. Through Bible studies and mentorship, along with initiatives like Varsity Catholic and FOCUS Greek, missionaries reach into every corner of campus life — inviting students of all backgrounds into a deeper relationship with Christ.

Running Toward Christ

"Varsity Catholic has given me a new lens to look through at life as a whole. Experiencing a group of people trying to win, build and send me out into the world led me to receive the Eucharist for the first time this year, and now I want to go do the same for others. I want to invite more souls into the beauty and peace I've encountered as a confirmed Catholic."

Digital Outreach

FOCUS Digital Outreach missionaries accompany students on campuses that don't have a team of missionaries on site, helping them grow in faith and live out the mission. This past school year, they served nearly 70 campuses — encouraging students, mentoring them in their faith and equipping them to share the Gospel in their communities.

Reaching Those Who Are Searching

"After taking part in a Bible study as a freshman last year, I was able to forge strong relationships with many of the other young men around the Catholic Center who were looking to dive deeper into their faith. Even after that first year of Bible study, I would still describe my faith as somewhat surface-level.

Having the opportunity to engage in group mentorship with a FOCUS missionary has added depth to my faith. It's hard to describe just how valuable it is to have another role model in my life who can teach from his own experiences — both in married life and in navigating the conflict between the college life that society glorifies and the life of faith we're all called to as children of God."

FOCUS Parish brings the model of missionary discipleship into everyday parish life. Missionaries serve alongside pastors and ministry leaders to build vibrant Catholic communities — places where individuals are invited into deeper relationships with Christ, formed through intentional accompaniment and sent to share the Gospel in their families and neighbors. From Bible studies and mentorship to sacramental life and priest support, FOCUS Parish is helping to renew the Church in local parishes and dioceses, one soul at a time.

The Power of Patient Discipleship

"My husband, Matt, and I started attending the local Catholic Church with our children in 2023. Matt grew up in the Catholic Church and had the desire to return. I agreed to go, but with much hesitation. I had many preconceived ideas about the Catholic Church that caused me to bristle and feel closed off to new ideas. The Schroeder family [FOCUS missionaries] was so incredibly gracious and kind in answering my questions and welcoming our family into the community at the parish. Through their patient instruction, I have such peace and confidence in entering the Catholic Church this Easter. The Schroeders not only explain the Catholic faith in such a real and humble way, but even more importantly they live it out so faithfully. Their example is what has given me a deeper trust in the teachings of the Catholic Church. I am guite confident in saying that I would not be entering the Church if it had not been for the grace of God and the intentional discipleship of the Schroeders. We pray they have the opportunity to bless many more as they have blessed our family."

Even when the school year ends, formation continues. FOCUS Summer Projects offers a ten-week immersive experience where students live in Catholic community, work full-time jobs and grow as missionary disciples. With daily Mass, Bible studies, mentorship and talks from top Catholic speakers, participants deepen their faith while gaining real-world experience — returning to campus equipped to lead and evangelize.

When Formation Becomes a Calling

"FOCUS was integral in my vocational discernment to postulancy with the Oblates of the Virgin Mary. Summer Projects in Newry, Maine, provided me an opportunity to live in a structured environment where a relationship with Our Lord took center stage. Daily Mass, adoration and confession became the highlight of each day, and, for the first time, I felt my heart melt before Him. That summer also began nearly three years of spiritual direction with the Oblates and deepened my love for God and His Church."

FOCUS Missions partners with communities around the world to serve those in physical and spiritual need. Whether building homes, caring for children or feeding the hungry, each trip offers a powerful encounter with Christ through service, prayer and authentic friendship.

Thanks to the generosity of our supporters, more than 1,800 students, missionaries and parishioners answered that call this year — loving as Christ loves and bringing His presence to the poor.

Finding Christ in the Heights and Heart

"The week I spent in Peru on a mission was the most joyful week I have ever experienced and likely the best week of my life. Through loving the poor and serving God's people, I was able to give of myself fully, and in return, the Lord responded with such an outpouring of love. Being able to enter into their poverty was so eye-opening to how the Lord really provides for us in every way and loves us in our nothingness. Hiking up the mountain each day to love and serve God's people has given surrender a whole new meaning. As alumni of FOCUS, Seun and Jackie Ogunmodede are now living mission at home — raising their children to know, love and follow Jesus in a culture that often rejects Him.

"In a world that tries to present a distorted view of truth, it has become important to us to make prayer, liturgy and spiritual reading a priority in our routine to draw closer to Christ. We are striving to teach our children the same so that they can someday navigate this world on their own."

Jackie served as a FOCUS missionary from 2014 to 2016, while Seun encountered the mission as a graduate student at the Colorado School of Mines. In 2020, after meeting through the FOCUS community, they were married. Their home is now a place of intentional discipleship. Jackie left her career in civil engineering to stay home with their young children while Seun works at MITRE, solving complex problems for the government. Together, they are striving to build a family rooted in Christ. "FOCUS helped teach us how to cultivate Christ-centered relationships, which we not only need in our community but in our family as well. Prayer with our children is a priority, along with open discussions about who Jesus is and how much He loves us."

As they continue to grow in their vocations as spouses, parents and disciples, Jackie and Seun remain grounded in the Gospel and the lessons they learned through FOCUS. "We are continuously learning from mistakes, turning back to Jesus again and again, and relying on His great love and mercy to become who He has created us to be.'



Awakened to Mission



Judy Dunn didn't expect to find her faith deepening at age 50 — but then God stirred something new inside her.

Raised Catholic, Judy had always gone to Mass and tried to do what was expected of her. But her relationship with Christ wasn't personal. After retiring early from a successful career in wine distribution, she began asking deeper questions. That's when God reignited her heart.

"I always wanted to join a Bible study, but I didn't even know how to open a Bible," she said. "Then I ended up in a study — on Revelation, of all things — and something clicked. It hit me: You don't 'have to go' to church. You get to go to church. That one word changed my life."

From that moment on, Judy's faith was no longer passive. It was hers — and she was ready to live it fully. As she stepped into this renewed faith, through the grace of God's timing, she came face to face with the mission of FOCUS. She met a young man named Colin, a FOCUS missionary, whose story left her speechless.

"He went to my alma mater, Southern Methodist University — a party school when I was there with no Catholic life to speak of. But Colin met a missionary there who brought him not only to the Christian faith, but into the Catholic Church. I was blown away."


That encounter prompted Judy to learn more. She met with FOCUS staff, visited campuses, attended SEEK — and quickly found herself all in. What began as supporting one missionary soon became a personal mission. She invited friends to SEEK, introduced others to missionaries and even hosted events in her home to share the vision of FOCUS with others.

"You don't feel pressure from FOCUS.

No one's coming at you with rules or judgment. Everyone's just on mission. And it's invigorating. You want to be part of it."

Judy has seen the fruit of the mission firsthand, especially at SEEK.

"To see thousands of young people on their knees in adoration for hours — it's incredible. If that doesn't give you hope for the Church, I don't know what will."

But the real joy, she says, is watching the ripple effect in her own parish, St. Vincent de Paul Catholic Church in Denver, where she's deeply involved. St. Vincent de Paul has hosted FOCUS parish missionaries for several years, and the impact is plain to see.

"There used to be just one Bible study, led by a deacon on Tuesday mornings. Now there are Bible studies for moms, for young men and even men in their 50s. I've seen guys who used to just show up on Sundays start going to Mass every day. One of them started his own Bible study. He's a different man — and his family knows it."

That fire has taken Judy far beyond her parish walls. She walked the Camino with FOCUS and returned inspired to keep going. She helped coordinate a parish pilgrimage to Chalco Girlstown in Mexico, run by the Sisters of Mary, and is now bringing the sisters to Denver so others can encounter their witness.

"What I really want is for people to see what the Church is doing," she adds. "We have so much to be proud of. I want them to witness it. To experience it. To be changed by it." That's what happened to her. Supporting FOCUS hasn't just drawn Judy into deeper mission — it's helped her take full ownership of her faith.

"I used to just go to Mass because I was supposed to. Now I walk into church and it's peaceful. It's reverent. I'm excited to be there. And that reverence has changed everything — how I pray, how I live, even how I talk about my faith."

Today, FOCUS is her top philanthropic priority.

"How can it not be? Look what it does. Look how it's grown. From an organizational standpoint, it's incredibly well-run. But most of all, everyone is on mission. You can't ask for anything better than that."

When Judy looks at FOCUS, she sees the hope of the Church: young people choosing Christ, parishes being renewed, vocations being born and lives — like hers — transformed.

"We're seeing a revival. And FOCUS is right in the middle of it."







Leading Others to the Heights of Faith

Tom Bruner never planned on a career with FOCUS. A natural entrepreneur, he once dreamed of running his own business.

"I never wanted to become a missionary," he reflects. "I kind of snuck expect it to change the direction of in the back door. And there were many times when I kept looking for the exit. I'd ask myself, 'Why am I thinking of leaving FOCUS? For a better schedule? More money?' I took it to prayer and realized those weren't meaningful reasons. They wouldn't fulfill me or lead me where the Lord was calling me."

Year after year, new opportunities within FOCUS opened up — and now, in his eighteenth year with the organization, Tom serves as vice president of Formative Enterprises. He leads a team that creates high-impact events and experiences — such as SEEK, retreats and mission trips — to foster opportunities for evangelization and forming missionary disciples. It's a role he never planned on, but it's one that aligns perfectly with the entrepreneurial spirit he once assumed would lead him elsewhere.

"Almost everything about FOCUS is entrepreneurial," he said. "And it's such a better mission statement than anything else I would have chosen. It's not that the Lord put the wrong desire in my heart; I always desired to do it.

I would have never chosen this path to get there, but I'm so much better for it."

Tom first encountered Christ at a SEEK conference. He was reluctantly dragged there by a FOCUS missionary. He didn't his life. But afterward, filled with new conviction, he went back to that same missionary and said, "You've got to go tell all of my friends what this is." The missionary responded: "No — you've got to tell them."

That moment planted a seed that would eventually lead Tom to say yes to becoming a missionary. He served for four years on campus and, over time, began to take on greater leadership roles across the organization. Eventually, he helped launch Formative Enterprises — a division dedicated to providing "jet fuel for mission."

"We have finite hours and resources," he said. "If our mission is to reach the world for Christ in this generation, then we have to ask: Is what we're doing the most effective way to reach more people?"

Tom and his team analyze every event through the lens of impact quantifying spiritual fruit in ways that help missionaries invest their time well. But the work isn't just analytical. It's deeply personal.

Each year at SEEK, Tom stands near the exit of the adoration and confession space and watches thousands of people pour out — many of them having returned to the sacraments for the first time in years. But the people who move him most are the priests.

"I just stand there and thank them. Some of them want a hug, but very few want to talk — it's too emotional. You can see it in their faces."

He recalled one chaplain who initially refused to attend SEEK. After a personal invitation, the priest agreed to come for just one night. He walked the halls alone, unfamiliar with the students and the event. But when Tom met him for breakfast the next morning, the priest was in tears.

"He told me, 'I was afraid to come because I was afraid to be around young people. I've stopped going to campus because I convinced myself no one wanted me there. But yesterday, all I heard was: Father, how are you? Father, can you join us? Father, can you hear my confession?'"

That priest went back to campus and took the door off his office.

Tom's mission field has evolved, but the call remains the same. He may no longer be walking with students on campus,

but he's still walking with people — now as a husband, father and leader.

He and his wife — Therese, also a former missionary — have four children with another on the way. Last year, Tom organized a mission trip with fellow dads from his children's Catholic school to Mexico City, a site of past FOCUS mission trips.


"It was life-changing for me and for them. And the conversation now is: When do we bring our kids?"

Tom's vision of mission has expanded, but the heart behind it hasn't changed. As he invests in his own family and community, Tom never forgets the moment that changed his life — the reluctant SEEK attendee-turnedevangelist. "We can never lose sight of what it is we're doing," he said.

"You may be behind a desk, but you're impacting souls. And that's energizing."

Whether in boardrooms or Bible studies, mission trips or morning prayer with his kids, Tom continues to live out the Gospel alongside his wife with conviction, clarity and contagious joy.

Friends,

When we lived in an age of Christendom — when Christianity was the basis of the culture's ideals and Christian principles guided art, science, education, law, and family life — it was easy to take one's Christian identity for granted. However, unless you have been living under a rock for the past few decades, you know that our age has changed. The foundations that upheld a Christ-centered worldview have been replaced by a secular view. Christianity no longer is the foundation upon which society builds its values and way of thinking. with FOCUS are discerning vocations to the priesthood and religious life. On and on, the multiplication continues, and the fruit grows.

In an apostolic age, though, we cannot remain complacent. We must be ready to preach the faith, defend the faith and even suffer at times for our Christian faith. We must be willing to participate in evangelization and share the Gospel with those whom God has put in our path. And despite how much FOCUS has grown year over year since its inception, the mission field also continues to grow.

Thank you for being a part of this mission to share Christ in this apostolic age. Your part in supporting FOCUS and your participation in this mission of evangelization is needed now more than ever.

Let's continue to bear the standard of Christ and, like the missionary disciples before us, bring the truth, beauty and saving redemption of Christ to the world around us.
